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School Building Committee News

The Anne T. Dunphy Renovation and Addition project, approved by Town Meeting in the spring of 2012, is moving submitted to the forward. The School **Building Committee** continues to work with **Drummey Rosane** Anderson, Inc. (DRA), project architect, and ARCADIS, our owner's project manager. The

process has continued on its projected track with the "60% construction documents" Massachusetts School Building Authority just last week. The School Building Committee, with support of the School Committee, has requested that the Department of Energy

Resources (DOER) contract with the US Forest Service Wood **Education and Resource** Center (WERC) to conduct a wood energy feasibility study to determine the feasibility of incorporation into the project. The project is on schedule with bids targeted to go out in January 2013 and construction anticipated to begin in March 2013.



Location Change for Annual and Special Town Meetings and Voting

With the Anne T. Dunphy School under construction beginning in spring 2013, all elections and Town Meetings will be held at the Williamsburg Town Offices, 141 Main Street, Haydenville.

News from the Mill River Greenway Committee

In recent years, during the Open Space Planning process and the Village Center Visioning, it became clear that there is a strong public interest in connecting the two village centers in Williamsburg with a non-automotive pathway. In response to requests by residents, the Select Board created the Mill River Greenway

Committee to explore the feasibility of the idea.

The basic idea is to create a multipurpose greenway roughly following the path of the Mill River, linking the village centers and providing public access to adjacent natural settings, historically important cultural landmarks, and local businesses.

The Greenway Committee's first goal is to explore what it would take to make this project possible, and to report its findings to the Select Board by June of 2013. Part of this exploration will involve respectfully reaching out to property and business owners along the potential route. It will be looking into varied sources of funding, public and private.

It welcomes questions and comments. It meets monthly at the town offices -- check the town calendar for the meeting dates. It will also be organizing a public input meeting as part of exploring this possibility.

News from the Williamsburg Schools

The 2012-2013 year is off to a great start! We started the year with 161 students and we had the opportunity to welcome several new staff members to our school community in September. During the summer months staff members worked tirelessly to merge the Anne T. Dunphy and Helen E. James school communities. You may recall that, although construction is planned to begin in the winter, the school district determined that the logistics of planning a school move and consolidation mid-year would substantially affect the educational momentum for our students and would significantly disrupt the routines that schools and classrooms work to establish at the beginning of each year. Having experienced the amount of time that was necessary to execute this transition, we are confident this was the right decision.

Throughout the summer, small repairs and upgrades were made at the Helen E. James School to accommodate an increased student and staff population. Areas of the building were painted and refreshed, a wall was constructed to create two classrooms in the former cafeteria area, many outdated materials were recycled or donated, and unusable items were discarded. The custodial staff worked incredibly hard all summer ~ and managed to maintain their smiles! We were also grateful to the Williamsburg Highway Department for their work in helping us to create some additional parking locations.

We are all very pleased with how smoothly the opening of school went in our 'new' school community! The



students and staff are *both* enjoying and experiencing the benefits of being in one building. Although there are occasional challenges with space, and need for creativity and flexibility at times, our students continue to have access to the same positive academic experiences.

The school is committed to maintaining the academic and enrichment opportunities our students have experienced in recent years. Thanks to many volunteers, we were able to continue the tradition of our fall Harvest Feast, and we have been able to welcome parents and community members to Open House events on four different occasions!

Our school has been granted a STARS Residency Grant from the Massachusetts Cultural Council. Through this grant, our students will have the opportunity to work with local storyteller and musician, John Porcino. He will work with students and teachers to enhance students' narrative story writing through storytelling techniques.

Our students have already had many opportunities to explore local resources in these first few weeks of school! Classes have visited Outlook Farm to learn about sustainable growing techniques, they have been on an electrofishing adventure with Hampshire Regional students and Department of Fisheries and Wildlife staff, they have visited the local post office, and have been visited by the Williamsburg Fire and Police Department for some lessons in safety! In the next few weeks, other classes will visit the Eric Carle Museum of Picturebook Art, the Beneski Museum of Natural History, and local artist studios.

Our staff and students continue to benefit from this very supportive community. We so appreciate the time that our parent volunteers, PTO, School Committee, and School Council members graciously provide to enhance our students' school experience. We are looking forward to a great year!

News from the Collector's Office

There never seem to be enough hours in the day and now the days are getting shorter again with winter approaching!! Here are a few tips that will help make tax paying a little easier for you.

Online payment links may be found at www.burgy.org, which will direct you to Unipay/UniGold to enable you to make your tax payments and water/sewer payments online. No stamps or adding another errand to your list!!

Using this link, payments are sent electronically. The site is safe and protected. Payments can be made using your checking account information or debit or credit card (MasterCard, Visa or Discover). Debit cards have a flat rate fee of \$3.95 and credit cards have a fee that is assessed on a per transaction basis. You have an opportunity to see what this fee will be before finalizing your transaction so that if you choose not to pay the fee, you can cancel the transaction. There is NO cost to the town; all fees are paid by the individual user. Due to certain regulations, Visa cannot be used for water/sewer payments; however MasterCard can be used for these transactions. "Online" payments through your own bank's website may take as much as 3 weeks before a check is received in my office which can result in interest charges if past the due date. Why not skip a step and pay through the town's website at www.burgy.org?!

Partial payments are accepted at any time (either in my office, online, or by mail) for water/sewer

payments or any taxes EXCEPT motor vehicle excise taxes. This can help lessen the blow of paying larger amounts several times a year. Interest applies for any amounts that are not received in my office by the due dates, Aug 1, Nov. 1, Feb. 1, and May 1.

Motor Vehicle Excise bills are generated by the Registry of Motor Vehicles – not the town! Any address changes must be handled through the registry, the town cannot make changes to addresses for these bills.



Real Estate and Personal Property bills are mailed twice a year – by July 1 and Jan. 1. Each mailing includes two payment coupons and a summary portion. Remember to save your Nov and May coupons as there is no additional billing for these times.

From the Assessors' Office

If you are a Senior 70 years of age or older, you may qualify for an exemption on your real estate taxes under Massachusetts General Laws, Clause 41C. There are both income and asset guidelines that you must meet in order to be eligible. Exemptions are also available to veterans with a

service-connected disability, or persons who are blind.

The Assessors' office is open Tuesday mornings from 9 to 12, and Tuesday evening from 7 to 8. We can also be reached at 413-268-8403, or assessors@burgy.org.

Winter Parking and Sidewalk Regulations

The Williamsburg Board of Selectmen wants to remind residents that the winter parking ban is in effect from December 1st through April 1st. During this time parking is prohibited on any street, regardless of whether we have snow or not, between the hours of midnight and 6:00 a.m., except in an emergency.


The Williamsburg Police
Department has the authority to
ticket and tow any vehicle in
violation. Residents adhering to
these regulations help our
community by ensuring that the
Highway Department can plow and
sand; that emergency personnel have
quicker access to emergencies; and

that streets are wide enough to keep normal daily traffic moving.

Residents and owners of all residential and commercial buildings are also reminded that they are required to clear the sidewalks on their properties within 24 hours of the end of any snow or ice storm and to keep these sidewalks free of snow and ice and properly sanded. The police are authorized to enforce this bylaw as well, with a fine if necessary.

With your help, we can ensure that both our roadways and our sidewalks remain open and accessible throughout the winter.





From the Fire Department

The new Fire Chief's vehicle that was authorized at the 2012 Town Meeting is outfitted and in service. It is a valuable addition to the Fire Department's fleet.

Reminder from the Chief, please check and replace the batteries in smoke and CO₂ detectors in your home.

As we continue to experience more unusual and severe weather patterns, it is clear that communities need always to be prepared. To maintain and enhance the skills of the On-call Firefighters, we continue to train monthly. Highway Department

The winter season will soon be here and along with it, snowy roads. The Highway Department does several things to make sure our roads are passable throughout a snowstorm and the entire winter. The most important



application of sand and salt is at the beginning of a storm. This prevents the snow and ice from bonding to the pavement. Sometimes this will be done even before the storm starts. This allows us to be able to scrape the pavement clean during the storm and then we apply more material at the end of the storm. We use a different mixture of sand and salt on the dirt roads, so if you notice that the blacktop has been sanded, we will be back to finish the dirt once we reload the trucks with the other mixture. At times, in between storms, we widen the roads by pushing the snow banks back with a bigger plow. If your driveway gets filled in after we have done this, please call 268-8405 and someone will come clean the end back out.

Newsletter/Facebook: We are now forming a mailing list of folks who want to receive a monthly mailing about our services, programs, events etc. Also, look for us on Facebook and read our blog at *williamsburgcoa.blogspot.com*.

Outreach: Are you worried about someone or unsure if you are entitled to services that would support on-going efforts to age in place? Our Outreach worker can meet with you to help determine this and assist you in accessing support services and entitlements like fuel assistance, food subsidies etc. Remember, waiting until there is a crisis almost always leads to a loss of independence.

Take Home Dinner Program: Weekly healthy meals available on Wednesdays. Sliding-scale fee (\$2.50-\$5.50), delivery available. Smith Vocational Culinary School is the current provider.

Companion Program: Weekly social visits available to

homebound elders, disabled adults and as respite for caregivers. Errands and non-medical rides can be arranged through this program as well.

Volunteer Opportunities (paid and un-paid):

- Medical drivers to provide elders with rides to appointments (pays \$15 or more per trip),
- Companion Workers for weekly visits to elders (pays a small stipend to cover gas expenses and time).
- Entertainers and Instructors to hold groups in art, photography, music, sewing, etc.

Board Member Opportunities: The Williamsburg Council on Aging Advisory Board is seeking more members. Are you interested in being part of informing the focus for services to community elders? The meetings are 3rd Wednesdays of the month at 11:00 at the Town Offices, (note: meeting will be the 4th Wed. this month, Nov. 28th). Come see what we are all about.

From the Police Chief

Dear Williamsburg Residents, Fall is in full swing and winter is just around the corner. I would like to take a moment to remind everyone of the Winter Parking ban which begins December 1st. From December 1st through March 31st there is NO NIGHT PARKING on any street in Town between the hours of 12:01 a.m. (midnight) and 6:00 a.m. This is true even if there

isn't any snow on the ground. This parking ban is described in the Town of Williamsburg traffic rules and orders Article IV, Section 3. The Williamsburg Police Department has the authority to ticket and tow any vehicle in violation. We also ask all residents to be mindful during snow storms and to keep all streets clear

of parked cars so that the Highway Department can properly clear the roadways. Any questions on the parking ban can be directed to the Police Department at 413-268-7237.

From the Emergency Manager

This past year at the urging of our Fire Chief Don Lawton, an Emergency Management grant was applied for and received to repair and bring back into service the sirens on each of the fire stations. Currently, the siren on the North Main Street fire station is operable. Our electrician is working on the siren for the South Main Street station, and once it is completely repaired, it will be remounted on the



roof of the Haydenville fire station. When both sirens are operable, they will be tested on Saturdays at noontime, on a schedule yet to be determined. Prior to the commencement of testing, we will send out a Reverse 911 call, so residents will not be alarmed. We are in the process of finalizing guidelines for the activation of the outdoor warning sirens as a part of our emergency notification system.

We plan to host a program sponsored by UMass Medical School covering Sheltering and Evacuation of People with Disabilities. This is a two part program – in January there will be an emergency responder training which will be offered to police, fire, EMS, and public health personnel from Williamsburg, Chesterfield, and Goshen. The second part of the program will be offered at a later date to community members who work with emergency responders.

Conservation Commission News

The Conservation Commission is sad to see longtime Commissioner Wilbur Loomis end his service. He has been a great source of knowledge about the local landscape and has provided invaluable continuity over the course of his many years on the Commission. The Commission is grateful for the dedicated service Wilbur has generously given to our town.

The Conservation Commission is accepting expressions of interest from individuals who are interested in joining the Commission, which is responsible for protecting the land, water and biological resources of our community. Much of the activity of the Commission centers on the administration of the Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act. However, the Commission is seeking an individual who would enjoy helping to expand its educational efforts and interacting with the Woodland Trails Committee and Open Space Committee. If you have an interest and a skill set that would be useful, please contact the Board of Selectmen. The Conservation Committee usually meets on the second and fourth Thursdays of each month except July and August when single meetings are held. Site visits are scheduled as needed on weekdays.

Senior Volunteer Tax Relief Program

The Town participates in the Senior Volunteer Tax Relief Program (sometimes called the Senior Work-Off Program), in which eligible seniors can do work for the Town and earn a reduction in property tax, up to \$1000 per household per year. There are still a few slots available in the program for the coming year. A person must be at least 60 years old and have a household income of no more than \$28.713. It is now permissible for someone else to do the work if the senior is physically unable to do so. Note that the tax reduction is counted as taxable income by the Federal Government. The application form is available from the Selectmen's Administrative Assistant (268-8400) or online. Deadlines on the form can be ignored, as there are still spaces available.

CIC Grant Awarded to HRHS District

The Hampshire Regional School District was awarded one of 28 Community Innovation Challenge Grants awarded by the Massachusetts Executive Office for Administration and Finance. The purpose of the Community Innovation Challenge Grant program is to invest in and incentivize innovation among local governments, including regional schools. The program supports innovation to assist in finding new and more efficient ways to deliver core local services or to improve internal efficiencies.

The Hampshire Regional CIC grant was funded to improve the efficiencies of the District's technological applications for human resources, accounting and finance, communication, and educational support in all of our schools and to increase the collaboration with the District's five towns (Williamsburg, Westhampton, Goshen, Chesterfield, and Southampton). The grant's specific goals include:

- 1. Regionalization of electronic data sharing;
- 2. Planning for implementation of the Massachusetts Broadband Initiative;
- 3. Improving regional school transportation for more efficient bus routing;

- 4. Research and development of a regionalized cost and resource sharing model for serving technology systems within our five school districts;
- Develop a regional presence and approach to creating a web site for the five districts that also expands from the schools to include the municipalities.

Recently, a survey was sent to school and municipal stakeholders to gather information about the use of technology in our schools and communities. This information will be used to plan and coordinate a regional meeting to share ideas and continuation plans. Grant funding ends in December 2012. The District will submit a continuation grant application to the Executive Office for Administration and Finance to expand and enhance our accomplishments, as well as to initiate new innovations to improve regional efficiencies and collaboration. Celebrating 10 years of Williamsburg Woodland Trails

Williamsburg is blessed to have a network of woodland trails, on private and public land, trails that wind through fields and forests, climb ridges, follow streams and connect us to the special and beautiful places in town. Ten years ago, the Williamsburg Woodland Trail (WWT) project began.

The goals of the WWT are to identify existing trails in town, work with public and private landowners to improve trails for appropriate community use, if they so desire, develop a coalition of all users to maintain and improve Williamsburg's trails for the future and strengthen the bonds of our community through this effort

After ten years, how have we done? There are over 70 miles of trails in town, mostly on private property, most not officially open to the public, but also most not posted. WWT has worked with four private property owners, three private conservation organizations, and two public agencies to open roughly 20 miles of trails in town as official public trails at nine different sites. Each year, the committee works with partners to open new trails, maintain existing trails, and lead a variety of events and programs.

The WWT project has built several bridges in town over the years, literally and we hope figuratively, to connect people and places, trails and landscapes. Many of our events bring people together under a full moon, overlooking the colored tapestry of the valley, or on the first day of each year as we prepare our resolutions.

Williamsburg Woodland Trails would not be successful without the support of our community, the willingness of so many volunteers to lend a hand, and the generosity of the landowners who allow the public to walk, hike, ski or ride on their lands.

Thank you, Williamsburg, and see you on the trails!


Watch the new Ken Burns film "The Dust Bowl," on WGBY November 18th or at the library in January with your neighbors. Participate in a discussion group.

The Board of Health coordinated with the Council on Aging to provide flu shots to our elderly residents in October and a VOTE and VAX program held on Election Day.


Nick Dines has taken over the bottle collection to benefit the Town's gardens. Thanks to the volunteers and the folks who bring their cans and bottles so that our Town's gardens can be maintained. Two rain barrels from the Great American Barrel Company were donated for the Town's use.

The trial Swap Shop coordinated by Madge Evers will be closing for the winter starting Nov. 1. We hope to open it up again in the spring.

Maintenance of the equipment and facilities is an ongoing job. This year we have purchased a new metal box, fixed the housing of the compactor, made improvements to the attendants' shed, and made repairs to the large garage.

Attendants will be using the new snow blower and a weed whacker to make the Transfer Station more convenient and safer for residents use.

In December we expect to institute a state-mandated program for the safe disposal of needles. Needle boxes will be available at the Clerk's office or at the Transfer Station. Filled boxes are to be returned to the Transfer Station, where they will be secured and then disposed of by a private company. This is the model that works very well in the Town of Goshen. We expect to have this operational the beginning of December.
